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
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

## **FULL SYNOPSIS**

Developing a treatment for malaria, two medical researchers Eric (Ricco Ross) and Geoff (Cade Carradine) find an issue in one of their experiment samples. They soon realize their discovery may be the key to creating a vaccine.

Eric seeks guidance from higher-ups within the company while Geoff returns home and shares the news with his wife Rachel (Marguerite Wheatley). As Eric struggles to convince his business-minded counterparts of the significance of their findings, Geoff shares his doubts about the company's ethics.

Rachel convinces Geoff to return to the lab, but Eric has already received the company's final decision.

We completed principal production on Vax well before the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, but as cancellations of public events continued through the Fall of 2022, I was unsure when to release the film. More than that, I was unsure how it would be received. This story is not about recent events or politics any more than my previous short Inheritance was about elder abuse. It has never been my intention to critique or debate the COVID-19 vaccines or policies concerning them.

In Vax, the possible discovery of a new vaccine tests the film's characters and forces them to choose between what is right and what is right for themselves. The real world and well-known behavior of pharmaceutical companies and other corporations establishes the invisible antagonist's motivation without too explicit an explanation. And in the end, as in so many situations, a decision that could affect millions is made by a select few, quietly, far away from those who would be helped or harmed.

I am extremely grateful to Cade Carradine, Ricco Ross, and Marguerite Wheatley for their support and lending their considerable talents to this project. Their remarkable performances, aided by a tireless and dedicated crew and filtered through my admiration for the works of Stanley Kubrick, Ridley Scott, and David Fincher all combined to create this short film we are all very proud of.

## 1. Was Vax a reaction to COVID, the pandemic, and/or the vaccine controversy?

Not at all. In fact, the film was written and filmed before the pandemic. The concept wasn't intended to be specifically about vaccines or the pharmaceutical industry, but rather "the banality of evil". The idea that a choice that could help millions of people is made in some mid-level manager's office is really terrifying.

COVID exacerbated the fear that companies were pushing a vaccine people didn't need for profit. Vax takes the other side of that, which is that medicine is being delayed to increase profits. And there is evidence of this:

# 2. The film could have played out more like a medical procedural, yet has a very ominous feeling, more like a thriller. What was your intention for the tone of Vax?

I wanted the visual environment to match the feeling of our main character. Objects are hidden in shadow, character's faces trail off into darkness, hallways and rooms are quiet and empty. This all informs the audience that something is wrong before the actual conflict develops.

The film has three sections: the setup, the debate, and the decision. But the idea that a decision needs to be made is not fully understood by the characters until the end of the debate. The atmosphere and tension created by the music and visual mood pulls the viewer through the first two sections with the promise of some type of confrontation by the end.

#### 3. How did you find your cast?

We were really lucky there. I was able to get the script to Cade, Ricco, and Marguerite and had great conversations with all of them. Cade and I bonded over our love for Blade Runner, and Ricco really responded to the ideas and themes of the film wrapped inside an engaging story. Marguerite solidified Vax's all-star lineup when she agreed to join the cast.

These actors have worked on major projects with some of the best filmmakers, and that's really no exaggeration. We were exceptionally fortunate they all came onboard. It meant we could accomplish everything we set out to do with limited time and budget because they operate at such a high level.

#### 4. Where was Vax filmed?

This is the funny part! I worked for an engineering company in Orange County, California. The owner of that company turned half of the building into an animal stem cell research facility. I was able to pull some strings and get us in there.

The hallway scenes of Cade walking around were shot in another office I worked at in downtown Los Angeles. And the scene of Cade and Marguerite talking at the table was shot in my house!

#### 5. What was the most challenging thing about making Vax?

Everything! Logistics are complicated, money is tight, resources are limited. But that's the fun of making a movie. The real concern I had was that the film would not be received in the way it was intended and become associated with other people's perspectives. But those concerns evaporated quickly after we released the film, and the response has been amazing!
